Name of Organization: New York Legal Assistance Group - NYLAG	
Brief Description of Organization: NYLAG was founded in 1990 on the premise that low-income individuals and their families can improve their lives significantly if given access to the justice system. NYLAG works to empower individuals, protect fundamental legal rights, and promote access to justice among vulnerable New Yorkers. Their pro-bono program is broken down into two separate divisions; the "Pro Bono Program", which entails referring pro-bono cases directly to large law firms, and the "Volunteer Program" in which volunteers are integrated into the NYLAG offices, supplied with a phone, a desk, and a supervisor.	
Population Served: Seniors, immigrants, domestic violence survivors, at-risk children, people with disabilities, people moving from welfare to work, Holocaust survivors, and individuals suffering from chronic and serious illness.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES	
Matrimonial and Family Law Unit: LGBT Law Project, Domestic Violence Clinical Center. NYLAG's Domestic Violence Clinical Center (DVCC) assists clients in obtaining orders of protection and provides representation in custody and visitation matters in family court. The DVCC operates as a collaborative project between NYLAG and area law schools. DVCC students litigate family offense and domestic violence-related visitation and custody cases. In addition, students are taught family, immigration and criminal law, as they relate to domestic violence.

Type of Work: Full Representation (Litigation).	
Location, Days and Hours of Volunteer Opportunity: Volunteers work at NYLAG's office.	Area of Substantive Law: Family Law.
Supervision: All volunteers are assigned a supervising attorney to work closely on a daily basis. The supervisors are more like mentors - every case has a mentor.	Training: For the Pro Bono program, NYLAG primarily relies on the law firm responsible for the case for training. They host occasional substantive law trainings throughout the year, which in-house volunteers are welcome to attend as well. Generally, the substantive training for the in-house volunteer program is more needs-based than for the pro bono program. Each individual unit decides how best to train their volunteers. NYLAG supplies training videos on Pro Bono Net. The volunteers are given written materials to familiarize themselves on the subject matter. The volunteers fundamentally get on-the-job training.
