

**CRIMINAL POSSESSION OF A CHEMICAL WEAPON  
OR BIOLOGICAL WEAPON  
THIRD DEGREE  
(C Felony)  
PENAL LAW 490.37  
(Committed on or after July 23, 2004)**

The \_\_\_\_\_ count is Criminal Possession of a Chemical Weapon or Biological Weapon in the Third Degree.

Under our law, a person is guilty of Criminal Possession of a Chemical Weapon or Biological Weapon in the Third Degree when he or she possesses

any select chemical agent [or]  
any select biological agent

under circumstances evincing an intent by the defendant to use such weapon to cause serious physical injury or death to another person.

Some of the terms used in this definition have their own special meaning in our law. I will now give you the meaning of the following terms: "possess," ["select chemical agent,"] ["select biological agent,"] "intent" and "serious physical injury."

POSSESS means to have physical possession or otherwise to exercise dominion or control over tangible property.<sup>1</sup>

SELECT CHEMICAL AGENT means an identified chemical

weapon, including (*specify*).<sup>2</sup>

SELECT BIOLOGICAL AGENT means an identified biological weapon, including (*specify*).<sup>3</sup>

INTENT means conscious objective or purpose.<sup>4</sup> Thus, a person acts with intent to use a

to cause serious physical injury or death to another person when his or her conscious objective or purpose is to do so.

SERIOUS PHYSICAL INJURY means impairment of a person's physical condition which creates a substantial risk of death or which causes death or serious and protracted disfigurement, protracted impairment of health or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily organ.<sup>5</sup>

In order for you to find the defendant guilty of this crime, the People are required to prove, from all the evidence in the case, beyond a reasonable doubt, both of the following two elements:

1. That on or about (date), in the county of (county), the defendant, (defendant's name) possessed any

*Select the appropriate alternative(s):*

any select chemical agent [or]  
any select biological agent ; and

2. That the defendant did so under circumstances evincing an intent to use such weapon to cause serious physical injury or death to another person.

Therefore, if you find that the People have proven beyond a reasonable doubt both of those elements, you must find the defendant guilty of the crime of Criminal Possession of a Chemical Weapon or Biological Weapon in the Third Degree as charged in the \_\_\_\_\_ count.

On the other hand, if you find that the People have not proven beyond a reasonable doubt either one or both of those elements, you must find the defendant not guilty of the crime of Criminal Possession of a Chemical Weapon or Biological Weapon in the Third Degree as charged in the \_\_\_\_\_ count.
